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Preferred Type of Postsecondary Institution by Family Income Level



- The percentage of ACT-tested 2013 high school graduates who would prefer to attend a private 4-year college or university increases as family income level increases.
- The percentage of 2013 graduates who hope to attend a public 2-year college or career/ technical school decreases as family income level increases.

Almost three-quarters of ACT-tested 2013 high school graduates reported that they would prefer to attend a public 4-year college or university over other types of postsecondary institutions. The chart below illustrates the differences between preferred type of postsecondary institution at various family income levels. While the percentage of students who hope to attend a public 4-year college or university stays relatively constant across income levels, preferences for other types of postsecondary institutions vary by family income level.
